<u>Revd Dr Ian Robinson</u>, Emeritus Scholar in Mission and Leadership, United Theological College in Sydney, presents our Introduction to the Open Day, on **how the churches have attempted to ride the waves of change since WWII**. Three kinds of response are needed. He observes a large number of approaches that appear to be effective today. He uses interdisciplinary studies to canvas how 'nuanced leaders can teach others to be nuanced'. Thirdly, we need to move beyond our anxieties and cultural defaults to build shared authentic spiritual practices.
