Tom Anayabere was born into a missionary family in 1965 and educated in mission schools. In 1986 he graduated with a bachelors' degree in

Electrical and Communications Engineering at the PNG University of Technology. He was awarded a Masters Degree in Electrical Engineering from the Victorian University of Technology in 1994.

Tom worked with the Post and Telecommunication Corporation in Port Moresby since 1987, most recently as the Executive Manager of products.

Convicted by God, and after 17 years of working in industry, Tom took up the position of General Secretary of the PNG Council of Churches at the beginning of this year.

Koila Costello-Olsson is married with two children and is a citizen of Fiji. She has a Bachelor of Social Work from the University of Queensland, and post-graduate Awards in Social



Administration and Social Policy and in Conflict Transformation.

Fe'iloakitau Kaho, or Fei as he is known is of Fiji/Tongan descent, and speaks English, French, German, Italian, Spanish, Fijian and Tongan. He has studied in the US and

France obtaining a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science and French, and post-graduate qualifications in International Relations, International Economics, Development Cooperation, Diplomacy, and the Administration of International Organisations.

From 1997 to 2000 he worked with the Pacific Concerns Resource Centre as the Assistant Director for Sustainable Human Development.

Fei is the Executive Secretary of the Pacific region for the World Council of Churches, formerly based in Geneva and now in Fiji.

He is admired for his unquenchable energy in leading and encouraging the ecumenical and regional work of the churches in the Pacific.

Adrian Smith



Archbishop Adrian Smith is a highly respected and loved statesman of the Solomons who has shared in the leadership of the country during a

period of upheaval and trauma.

He arrived in the Solomon Islands from Ireland as a Catholic priest and from 1966 until 1983 he served in various parishes of Guadalcanal and Malaita provinces.

In 1985 he was installed as Archbishop of Honiara. During the early days of ethnic tension in 1999 the Archbishop was a member of the Government Peace Process Committee and the Chair of the Government's Missing Persons Committee. He continues to serve the church and community as Chair of the Solomon Islands Christian Association.

At the Crossroads...

Beneath the Pacific smile lie issues of land and identity that are undercurrents to social tensions. The churches find themselves facing challenges they were not necessarily prepared for and need the partnership of churches in Australia".
