

Community liturgy - linking to local resources

Prayer and worship are vital elements of the local church community. Liturgy is an expression of that community, what is central to its beliefs, its life, its dreams and its concerns. As a congregation, you may wish to explore the preparation of a liturgy/series of liturgies for the Decade to Overcome Violence as a group activity, where local issues and concerns are considered, and the gifts and abilities of members are used.

Some options -

- A one-off liturgy focussing on the Decade to Overcome Violence
- A series of liturgies that consider different issues relevant to your local community
- resetting aside one Sunday every six months, or every year to focus on the Decade and current issues, for the remainder of the Decade

Ecumenical and community opportunity

This is also a great opportunity to work ecumenically and with other groups in the community. A community time of worship, focussing on local issues or areas of need, would be a very appropriate community action of peace-building. You maight explore -

- Involving the local community centre, community groups, local council and schools
- Method in the worship in a public space eg community centre, local park, local library
- It may be on a significant day for the community, a time of reflection at night with candles, or at sunrise welcoming the new day while contemplating new ways of thinking and doing
- Making a community commitment to building peace and overcoming violence in particular areas relevant to your community

Remember -

- People and children of all ages have something to offer
- ► Have plenty of time to prepare so that people don't feel rushed or under pressure
- For coffee, over dinner, for lunch in a park?
- Make the liturgy/worship inclusive of everyone (think about music, who is speaking, art, words that are used, stories that are told etc)
- ▶ Use inclusive language





Song and Hymn Board

There are of course many, many possibilities for sharing Christ's Peace in song and music, but here are a few starters:

Compassionate and justice-loving God, we see your face -

Hear our prayer, and lead us on.

We recognise the widening gap between the rich and the poor, in our own country, and within the whole human community. Help us, O God, to uphold the rightful claims of the poor on the resources of this nation and the world; and to seek to identify and challenge all social and political structures and all human attitudes which perpetuate and compound poverty.

Compassionate and justice-loving God, we seek your face -

Hear our prayer, and show us our common humanity.

We affirm the belief that the natural world is your creation. Recognising the vulnerability of the life and resources of creation, help us to work to promote the responsible management, use and occupation of the earth by human societies; and to seek to identify and challenge all structures and attitudes which perpetuate and compound the destruction of creation.

Compassionate and justice-loving God, we seek your face -

Hear our prayer, hold us together, lead us on, show us our common humanity, Justice-loving God. Amen.

With this water, fill our hearts with a clean spirit.


Lord have mercy.

Jesus, you wept over Jerusalem where the forces of domination were everywhere, and you weep today over the escalating domination - all the 'isms - in our own society & world.

music with violent lyrics; products made in sweat shops or by child labour;

financial investment in companies which produce violence.

- ▶ Give to efforts which address the causes and consequences of violence
- and consider volunteering to help with projects supporting reconciliation and peace-making in your church and community

Themes: anticipation, courage, joy, presence

Readings used in liturgy:

Isaiah 2:1-5 Isaiah 35:1-6 Psalm 146 Philippians 4:4-9

This liturgy requires 4 purple candles and 1 white candle

Creation on our planet has faced many challenges, much disquiet, times of fear and terror, and presently times of war. As the community of Christ, we too face the challenge of our response to the events happening globally. The readings used for this liturgy have a clear message - our God, present in all things, is a God of justice and peace. If we are truly members of this community, then this must also be our goal. The future will not be easy, but as we journey together, we can find courage and companionship as we work together, with our God, for the transformation of creation. Peace be with you.

Litany of Longing - for peace and justice

Candle for the continuing presence of God [white]

We light a candle to acknowledge God's presence with us.

Be close to us, loving God, as you have been with people down through history.

In these uncertain times when we fear for our future give us strength and resolve to act with honour and courage

Candle for seeking justice [purple]

Read: Psalm 146

as bearers of your love.

We light a candle for justice. Sustain us, God who protects as we strive to stand for justice. Help us

to uphold the rights of the downtrodden to speak for those who are not allowed to speak to welcome those who are seeking refuge.

Candle for peace [purple]

Read: Isaiah 2:1-5

We light a candle for peace.

Illuminate us, God of light

and show us again

how we can live in peace.

Teach us

to walk together

to listen to your wisdom

to see in the faces or our sisters and

brothers

the spark of your image.

Recognising and Addressing Violence

Leader:

Our Christian tradition is no stranger to violence. We have fought wars in the name of Christ. We have sung hymns with violent and warlike language in the name of Christ.

We celebrate the martyrs of the church and worship the Crucified Christ. Yet in Christ God has reconciled the world to himself. We are aware of the need to work towards reconciliation and peace with each other; fully to become people in God's own image. As we do so let us acknowledge the past and where we fall short of love.

Voice One:

For the times we resort to aggression, violence and intolerance towards others.

ALL: Forgiving God, we seek wholeness

(a candle is extinguished)

Voice Two:

For the times we have caused pain in others either willingly or unknowingly.

ALL: Forgiving God, we seek wholeness

(a candle is extinguished)

Voice Three;

For the times we have watched and benefited from the violence of others.

ALL: Forgiving God, we seek wholeness

(a candle is extinguished)

Voice Four:

For the times we have remained apathetic to the violence in our society; standing back, being too afraid or too busy to become involved in helping those in need.

ALL: Forgiving God, we seek wholeness

(a candle is extinguished)

Sounds of violence are heard and time given for reflection

Reading of Scripture

PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

Voice One:

Lord Jesus Christ, you assumed our poverty to transform it. We pray for those whose life is ground out of them by the violence of poverty; for those in our cities and towns, for those in distant lands, especially those living in countries burdened by international debt. To all these you have promised the kingdom of God. We pray for that kingdom and its coming. Maranatha!

(a candle is lit)

ALL: O Lord hear my prayer: when I call answer me. O Lord hear my prayer, O Lord hear my prayer: come and listen to me.

Voice Two:

Loving God, you gave your prophet a vision of the day when swords will be turned into ploughshares. Our hearts ache as we remember before you the casulaties of war: civilians, soldiers, rivers and forests, and all your creatures. We look now to that day when war will be no more, and you will split the full metal jacket of our hearts to reveal living hearts for peace.





Prayer and Worship Resources

(a candle is lit)

ALL: O Lord hear my prayer...

Voice Three:

Accepting God, you inspired your apostle Paul with a vision for our world: a world in which there is no Jew or Greek slave or free, male or female. May we, your creation who are so prone to reacting brutally to differences, may we be inspired with Paul's vision. Teach us not to identify and evaluate each other by our differences, but to see each other as you see us in Christ Jesus, whole and complete. For those cultural groups in which racial hatred and violence are traditionally intrinsic, we ask that you would uncompromisingly use us as salt and light for change. Inspire us with courage, lead us with patience and use us with persistence.

(a candle is lit)

ALL: O Lord hear my prayer...

Voice Four:

God of peace, it is inconceivable that a country which is so proudly cultured and sophisticated, should be so ready to inflict injury on its own members. We hear of the obscene violence inflicted upon women, children, the elderly and other, vulnerable, people and it sickens How you must weep. The very relationships which should promise supreme safety become putrid prisons for the powerless. Help us to end it. Give safety to those who experience within relationships, violence those who repentant shame to perpetrate that violence.

(a candle is lit)

ALL: O Lord hear my prayer...
